#### Get to Know Us

This month's feature is on: Jason Johnson.

# Tell us about yourself:

I am a 4th generation farmer and grew up as an only child. I went to Yorkwood High School and graduated in 2006. I am a Volunteer Fire Fighter for LYFPD (Little York Fire Protection District) The fire department responds to around 40 to 60 calls a year. We have six fire trucks that are in use. I have been active on the department for three years now. I like to hang out with friends and family, weld, travel, have cookouts, shoot guns, and go boating.

# Did you grow up in agriculture?

Yes, I did. My family raises yellow corn and yellow soybeans. We also have livestock, which includes around 100 head of cattle that we breed out to have a spring and fall herd of calves each year. We have two hog confinements which hold 1,200 pigs each, so we have around 2,400 in total. We are a wean to finish operation; we get baby pigs when they are a day old (around 5lbs) and grow them up to around 300lbs. We do two rotations of this each year.

### Where did you go to college? What is your degree in?

I went to Carl Sandburg College in Galesburg, a two-year trade college. I received my Certification in Welding. I thought it was a very good trade program to be enrolled in.



# How many years of experience do you have in agriculture? What areas of the industry have you worked?

I could say my experience would be around twenty-five years, as I was always riding around with my Dad on the tractor. Outside of the family farm, I worked at Monsanto right out of high school for a few years. I worked at Alexis Fire Equipment in the welding fabrication department for about a year and a half. I also worked at the Monmouth Quarry as a truck driver and then field manager for over four years.

# What advice would you give students considering a career in an agriculture related field?

Be confident, and also be a good listener and be patient. Good things come to those who wait.

# What benefits do you get from the Farm Bureau Young Leaders?

I enjoy meeting and interacting with younger farmers around the area like myself and learning about their professions. I appreciate trying to get the younger generation of ag students to be interested in different areas of agriculture.
